Course: BT 104: Beers of the World

Credits: 3

Prerequisites: None

Description: An introduction to brewed alcoholic beverages and hard ciders from various regions of the world including historical significance, production practices, styles and cultural context. Sensory evaluation of beer is a component of this course, so students must be 21 years of age or older. Course materials fee applies.
