Course: CG 114 Digital Photography

Description

This is an introductory course in basic usage of the digital camera and creating digital images. Students will learn the essentials of digital imaging along with the visual elements and design principles as they apply to photography. Students will explore content and composition in addition to technical skills. Students will also learn how to use scanners, printers and Adobe Photoshop software.

Learning Outcomes

At the completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Develop the skills to use camera controls as applied to basic digital camera platforms.
- Apply and comprehend visual elements and design principles as they pertain to photography.
- Develop a working vocabulary about photography and digital photographic images.
- Apply Adobe Photoshop to edit and print photographic images.
- Discuss their own photographs and those of others in a constructive class critique.
