Course: CJ 206 Introduction to Terrorism

Credits: 3

Prerequisites: RD 100, EN 060

Description:

A practical approach to the fundamental concepts and techniques necessary to understand the underlying principles of Terrorism and Terrorist Activity. The student will demonstrate a proficiency in defining analyzing fact patterns, comparison of facts to known standards and research to establish conformity to the definitions of Terrorism. The student will possess a basic understanding of the history, development, and Criminal Justice responses to Terrorism.
